ANTI-SEX TRAFFICKING— AN UPDATE ON SENATE BILL 851

NCJW Greater Philadelphia Section joined our coalition partners on the Pennsylvania Anti-Human Trafficking Advocacy Work Group in Harrisburg to support passage of Senate Bill 851. While the earlier passage of the federal Trafficking Victims Protection Act and Pennsylvania's Act 105 provides that any minor used in a commercial sex act has victim status, these acts did not provide for complete immunity from criminal charges for prostitution. Senate Bill 851 would close this loophole. Rather than being referred to the juvenile justice system for delinquency proceedings, a child would be treated as a victim and referred to the dependency system for services.

Just 15 minutes after arriving at the capital, our NCJW representatives learned that the SB 851 was blocked from passage for reasons as yet unclear. The bill appears at greater risk as its passage requires that it be re-introduced in the next legislative session. Our group made efforts to learn the circumstances of the bill's delay and present our concerns to legislators. We first met with the legislative aide for State Senate Majority Leader Jake Corman, the state senator who pulled the bill from consideration. His aide seemed unable to respond to our inquiries. Although, the bill had not moved from the senate to the house,we then met with State Representative Steve McCarter who asked questions and took notes on our concerns. Lastly, we met with the legislative aide for State Senator Art Haywood, Lianna Walters. Our meeting with Ms. Walters felt particularly productive in that she eagerly engaged with us for our mutual benefit to identify and analyze factors and potential resources to help pass this bill.

A DANGEROUS AND PUNITIVE ANTI-GUN SAFETY BILL

The "Standing/Sue Our Cities Bill"

On October 17, the Pennsylvania State Senate once again passed the same bill that was declared unconstitutional almost a year ago. This bill, as did the last, gives the right to the NRA to sue any city, borough or town in PA for passing any sensible gun safety measure, but was reworded to sound "less unconstitutional". The expense of lawsuits would most likely discourage townships from passing gun safety measures. When the legislature convenes its next session, the bill will likely be up for passage by the

Pennsylvania House of Representatives.

TO MEET THE THREAT of this bill's harmful potential to obstruct communities' efforts to promote their safety, YOU CAN CALL OR E-MAIL your Pennsylvania House Representative ASAP and tell him or her not to vote for this dangerous bill. Rabbi Richard Steinbrink, ordained at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, has served numerous congregations in NJ, NY and Rodeph Shalom in Philadelphia. He is past president of the Jewish Campus Activities Board of Greater Philadelphia (Hillels) and of the Delaware Valley Association of Reform Rabbis and National Association of Retired Reform Rabbis. Rabbi Steinbrink has served on the Phila., District Attorney's Youth Aid Panel and has been the Part-time Jewish Chaplain at Jefferson Hospital for the past 15 years.

He is also a Life Member of NCJW

Robin Axelrod Sabag, a licensed Social Worker, is the Assistant Director, Counseling and Therapeutic Services at JFCS. She oversees all clinical programs, the domestic violence intervention and prevention program as well as care management services. Her clinical training has prepared her to assist clients with a variety of

Robin has an extensive background working with clients who are healing and repairing from recent or past psychological trauma. From 2006 to 2012, she was employed as an individual, family and group therapist at a residential treatment center for women with eating, anxiety, depression, and personality disorders. She has maintained a private practice and worked in outpatient settings and in community health centers. Additionally, Robin has been an adjunct professor at Temple University.



Directions to Paulsdale



From I-295 North or South

Take Exit 40: Route 38 West/Moorestown. Just before 3rd traffic light, take jug handle on right for Mount Laurel Road. Turn left and cross Route 38 onto Mount Laurel Road (there is a gas station at the intersection). Turn right onto the second street, Hooton Road. *Paulsdale* is approximately 1/4 mile on the left.

From New Jersey Turnpike North or South

Take Exit 4: Moorestown/Philadelphia. Follow Route 73 North (stay in right lane). Turn right at Fellowship Road. Continue on Fellowship Road for several miles through five traffic lights until you get Route 38. Turn right at Route 38 and continue to Mt. Laurel Road. Turn right on Mt. Laurel Road and make another right at Hooton Road just one block from Rt. 38. *Paulsdale* is approximately 1/4 mile on the left.

From Philadelphia

Take Ben Franklin Bridge to Route 30 East/Admiral Wilson Blvd. Follow signs to Route 38 East/Moorestown and Mount Holly (the exit ramp is on your left). Continue on Route 38 East and pass Moorestown Mall (on your right). Beginning with the traffic light at Nixon Drive (the first road after the Mall), continue to the 6th light, Mount Laurel Road. Turn right onto Mount Laurel Road (there is a gas station at the intersection). Turn right onto the second street, Hooton Road. *Paulsdale* is approximately 1/4 mile on the left.

Parking

A parking lot is located at the rear of the property (signs are posted). Cars may not be parked on the driveway loop or on the grass.




