Co-President's Message

The month of October has been filled with celebrations – from all the Jewish Holidays to our upcoming visit from Beatrice Kahn, the President of NCJW for our membership luncheon. And how can we forget Sheila Katz, NCJW CEO's joining us for our opening luncheon in September? Makes me remember all we have to be grateful for. As we enter November, I have been thinking of my family and our Thanksgiving dinners.

Three of my four grandparents were immigrants. They came to America to escape the persecution of Jews. They struggled to settle here and raise a family while learning English and trying to earn a living. We celebrated the Jewish holidays as a family. I grew up on a street that was predominantly Jewish. Most of us had grandparents who were able to celebrate with us. Some of my friends' grandparents lived with them. We were a community.



Most of the families on Mohican Street bought their row houses when they were built in 1942.

We were the war babies although we didn't know much about the war until we were older. We were a very happy group of friends and neighbors. We played together as a group of kids on a block filled with kids of the same age.

It wasn't until 3rd grade that my sense of belonging felt challenged. I had stayed home to celebrate a Jewish holiday. I went back to school to a rude awakening. My teacher told me my absence note was not acceptable because it said I was out for a Jewish holiday. At eight years old, I was shocked by her words. When I told my mother she was outraged, as apparently were other mothers on our street. Apparently the wrath of the Mohican Street Mothers caused quite a furor. In protest, our mothers kept us home for every holiday that year and nothing was said again.

Thanksgiving was the one holiday that included all of the families on Mohican Street – Jewish and Christian alike. It was the most inclusive holiday of the year for me. We all ate turkey or chicken, stuffing, pumpkin pie, or lemon meringue – depending on whose mother was baking what. We shared the joy of being in America and being free. Not to mention the extra days off from school!

The history books teach us many lessons about that first Thanksgiving so long ago. We learned songs about how we "gather together". Here's what else I remember from lessons learned:

In November of 1621, a successful corn harvest led to the colonists and Native Americans sharing a feast together. The plentifulness of food which included turkey, deer, and fish seemed to foster respect and the communal sharing of their bounty. I was amazed to learn how much the Pilgrims didn't know about farming and how grateful they were to survive. Thus, both groups experienced their differences and interdependence and shared a feast.

I believe acceptance is a part of everything we do. NCJW teaches us how to be accepting of each other, to see the validity of others' viewpoints especially when we feel strongly about an issue. We must see to it that every person is included and respected.

This Thanksgiving I hope we all take a moment to remember that our mission is to "improve the quality of life for women, children and families and safeguard individual rights and freedoms." I am especially grateful for the continued good health of my children and grandchildren. The older I get the more grateful I am for all the blessings I enjoy.

Happy Thanksgiving – a National Holiday we can all share.






