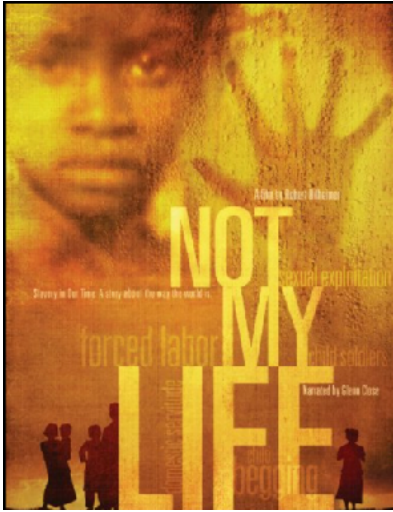

NCJW BOARD APPROVES GRANTS TO THREE LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS

The NCJW Greater Philadelphia Section Board approved grants to the following three Philadelphia area non-profit organizations at its meeting on November 6th.

The organizations receiving funding are the Mitzvah Circle Foundation (MCF), Rubye's Kids and the Beth Sholom Congregation Mitzvah Food Pantry.

The Mitzvah Circle Foundation is a non-profit organization that provides material support to individuals and families dealing with crisis, poverty, homelessness and serious illness. MCF provides essential resources through three programs: Critical Needs, Diaper Bank and Period Supplies.

Rubye's Kids was started 26 years ago as a holiday party for 75 inner city children and currently provides gift bags for about 500 K-4 students in two high poverty Philadelphia schools. The children receive gift bags containing a hat and gloves, toiletries and school supplies. The children have the opportunity to select a significant toy/sports equipment and a book for their holiday gift. This event has been expanded to help children throughout the year with six Rubye's Kids Learning Centers with libraries, games and computers in homeless shelters and annually purchases winter coats for children in shelters.

The Beth Sholom Congregation Mitzvah Pantry provides food to members of the community who experience food insecurity. With this funding, the Pantry will be able to provide more nutritious options for these families, such as fresh produce.

The Grants Committee members are Paula Bursztyn Goldberg, Sandy Fryer, Judith Ginsberg, Joan Sax, Diane Steinbrink and Wendy Rader, Committee Chairperson. We encourage non-profit organizations to apply to its grant program for consideration of funding opportunities.

Menashi Confirmation a Stain on the Integrity of the Senate, Judiciary

November 14, 2019 – Washington, DC – The National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) today expressed disappointment at the confirmation of Steven Menashi to the US Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit. NCJW Chief Policy Officer Jody Rabhan released the following statement:



“Today, the Senate gave Steven Menashi lifetime access to preside over our fundamental rights – from reproductive and voting rights to gun violence prevention and beyond. The National Council of Jewish Women strongly condemns his confirmation. The integrity of the judiciary depends on its complete independence and insulation from politics; unfortunately, partisan nominees like Menashi continue to be approved by the Senate without regard to their biases or other disqualifying qualities. Menashi has called for “ethnonationalism,” worked to help roll back protections for survivors of sexual assault, and worked in the White House as a legal advisor to advance unconscionable immigration policies like family separation. Notably, Menashi refused to answer questions related to his work in the White House during his judiciary committee hearing. His positions go against our Jewish values of loving the stranger and treating all with dignity. Menashi does not belong in a position that allows him to decide the fate of our most vulnerable populations for generations to come.

“Despite our extreme disappointment today, NCJW will continue to push for fair and independent judges to be appointed to our federal courts, for the benefit of women, children, and families everywhere. We will not let the appointment of Steven Menashi distract us from being vigilant about protecting our courts.”

It is simply disgraceful that Steven Menashi was confirmed last week to a lifetime position on the federal bench. Despite having worked on immigration policy at the White House alongside Stephen Miller. (Sorry to say that like Stephen Miller, Menashi is Jewish. Clearly, they both lack Jewish values.) Despite Menashi having served as Betsy DeVos’s right-hand man, working against sexual assault survivors, students of color, students with disabilities, and LGBTQ people. Despite the fact that the president who nominated him is involved in an impeachment hearing. And despite all our advocacy efforts.

Are we gonna just give up? NO WAY.

When you call or send a letter to Sen. Toomey to voice your disappointment over yet another vote where he marched in lockstep on purely party lines, you can also let him know how you feel about the next two horrible nominees who will be voted on.

Sarah E. Pitlyk, nominated to the US District Court for the Eastern District of Missouri, earned a unanimous “Not Qualified” rating from the nonpartisan American Bar Association for her lack of experience and has built a career out of undermining reproductive health care, from abortion to in-vitro fertilization (IVF) to birth control.

Lawrence VanDyke, nominated to the US Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, has dedicated his career to anti-reproductive rights and anti-LGBTQ causes and earned a rating of “Not Qualified” from the nonpartisan American Bar Association for his temperament, bias, and lack of relevant knowledge.

Remember, these biased, far-right nominees, beholden to President Trump, will wield power on the bench in their districts but that will affect what happens in our federal courts here in Pennsylvania and throughout the federal judiciary. They will rule on every aspect of our lives. And because these are lifetime positions, their decisions will affect us, our children, and our grandchildren.

Call or email Senator Toomey and tell him that as his constituent, you are horrified that Menashi was confirmed, and that Pitlyk and VanDyke lack the most basic qualifications—a qualified rating from the ABA—and don’t deserve his vote.
