Tuesday morning found us proceeding silently (yes, progressive Jewish women were silent!), in single file, from the US Supreme Court to the US Capitol. The copies of the Constitution were delivered to Judiciary Chairman Grassley, along with our letters saying do your job.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In "PIRKEI AVOT", The Ethics of the Fathers, 2:21; Rabbi Tarpon said: "You are not required to complete the work, but neither are you at liberty to abstain from it."

I know I have used this quote before but it always bears repeating. Whenever I feel frustrated about the overwhelming problems and social injustice around us and feel at a loss to make a big difference, this quote sustains me.

Consider that women's rights, especially reproductive rights, are being eroded throughout our country. Food insecurity faced by so many of our citizens, is so immense that, as reported in Mazon Magazine, "Even the nation's largest antihunger organization cannot make a dent in ending hunger in America." Sex trafficking and domestic violence are widespread human tragedies.. I can go on and on. Does this mean, we should throw up our hands and do nothing? Of course not! Jewish wisdom such as Rabbi Tarfon's quote inspires us to do what we can.

We show our resolve to continue our advocacy for those in need: we make phone calls, sign petitions, write letters, lobby our states as well as Washington. We engage with the larger lobbying efforts of our National organization, just as four of our section members are currently doing with others at the NCIW Washington Institute in DC.

We educate ourselves and as many other people as we can about sex trafficking and advocate for stronger laws to protect victims. We help a local shelter for women trying to escape this form of slavery. We help alleviate food insecurity by donating food and giving grants to pantries and providing food gift cards for Jewish victims of domestic violence. These efforts as well as other projects we sponsor have reinforced our belief that impacts come in different sizes, ALL meaningful.

Several people have told me that we produce a most educational and inspiring bulletin. In this issue, don't miss: an article by Jackee Swartz about her experience volunteering for the Youth Symposium on the Holocaust; Zelda Stern's article about our most recent Guest Chef breakfast at the Ronald McDonald House; an article about our volunteers at a nearby Philadelphia elementary school who are inspiring children to learn to read and impressions sent to us by our members attending the Washington Institute.

We do what we can, one step at a time. We always need more people to help. We need you! How can you help in addition to what you are already doing? Call me to discuss how you can take the next step. I can assure you that you will not regret it.





#### **Holocaust Awareness**

What an honor it is to work together with Holocaust Survivors! Through the Holocaust Awareness Museum at the Klein Life Center, I have had the opportunity to go with Holocaust Survivors to venues including schools, rotary club meetings, and large scale symposiums. It is very rewarding to do my part to make sure their stories are remembered. I also believe it is a way to honor all the millions of people who did not survive. Just today, March 14, 2016, Ernest Gross, a survivor, and I spoke to a large group of students at the Holocaust Symposium at Gratz College. After Ernie's talk, we opened up the floor to questions. One question that comes up often is, "What is your feeling about people in Germany." Ernie and other survivors I have volunteered with ALWAYS answer by saying that they will not and cannot blame the generation of people who were born after the Holocaust for things that happened in the past. Ernie also told the students that once a man asked him the same question and he gave the same response. The man jumped up on the stage to hug Ernie. This man was a German citizen and had struggled with this for many years of his life. Ernie's acceptance and warmth towards him made a tremendous difference. I encourage you as fellow NCJW members to get involved with this project. As I mentioned above, I am honored to do this and I learn more about myself and my perceptions each time I spend the day with survivors.



At a breakout session, Monika Rae Simpson of Sister Song led the way, with Lynne Jacobs close behind, to show the intersection of the Black Lives Matter movement and Reproductive Justice.





After receiving an award from Marge Weiser, Wade Henderson, President of the Leadership Conference on Human and Civil Rights, thanked NCJW for decades of working closely together. He explained that we, and our Senators, should look at the Constitution, Article II, Section 2, Clause 2, for the law on Supreme Court vacancies.



On Monday afternoon, Susan Weiss explained the Supreme Court in Israel, as Dahlia Lithwick shared her candid opinions on the SCOTUS vacancy. Nan Arons, of the Alliance for Justice, moderated.



Privileged to take in Monday night the incredibly moving story behind US v. (Edith) Windsor (right) as argued brilliantly before the Supreme Court by Roberta Kaplan (left), explaining how the Defense of Marriage Act, or DOMA was defeated. Two other NCJW families shared the stories of their triumphs for gay marriage, and there wasn't a dry eye in the house.
