Their thoughts are compelling, expressing their understanding of the forces of intolerance as an aspect of human nature, accessible for exploitation with devastating human consequences.

#### Six Million Paper Clips - The Making of a Children's Holocaust Memorial

In 1998, an 8th grade project in Whitehall, Tennessee to teach children lessons of tolerance, evolved into an educational program on the Holocaust, one gaining world wide attention. An award-winning documentary film, PAPER CLIPS, about the project, was released in 2004. A book, SIX MILLION PAPER CLIPS chronicling the project, was written by Peter and Dagmar Schroeder. Subsequently, through the efforts of one of our NCJW Greater Philadelphia Section members, Phyllis Kedson, the Paper Clips project became a focus of our interest for our NCJW section. Phyllis became the chairperson of this endeavor as well as past president and Marcie Sussman the program vice-president. At the invitation of Phyliss and Marcie, the authors of the book, SIX MILLION PAPER CLIPS, made a presentation of their Paper Clip Program at an NCJW meeting.

Now many years later, a DVD copy of the documentary film and a copy of the Schroeders' book will be presented to the Holocaust Awareness Museum and Education Center at Klein Life in memory of Marcie Sussman by NCJW member and sister of Marcie Sussman, Bobbie Berman.



Those who view the documentary and/or read the book on the Paper Clips Project will learn among other things how a school principal, assistant principal and teacher acted on their commitment to start a Holocaust education program. Overwhelmed by the scale of the Holocaust, the children wanted to collect something that would commemorate the lives that were lost. The Tennessee students discovered that Johan Vaaler, a Norwegian, designed a loop of metal, the paperclip, which Norwegians wore on their lapels during World War II as a silent protest against Nazi occupation. The students created a website to collect 11 million paper clips (6 million for murdered Jews and 5 million for Roma, Catholics and other groups). Their project snowballed after receiving the attention of Peter and Dagmar Schroeder, reporters for German newspapers covering the White House and who were born in Germany during the second World War.

The Schroeders published articles and a book on the project, promoting the project in Germany. Intent on finding a way to house the paperclips sent to them, the Schroeders went to Whitehall to meet with the originators of the project. Sandra Roberts, the 8th grade teacher, provided the solution when she recalled her class walking through a railcar used to transport Nazi prisoners, when visiting the Holocaust Museum in Washington, DC Thus began the Schroeders' search for a railcar.

The Schroeders' letters to the head of the German government, Gerhard Schroder, to railroad museums, private rail companies, and rail experts bore no fruit. Determined, the Schroeders left for Germany. There, many cities later they learned of a railcar at a museum in Ganzing, Germany and convinced the museum's director to sell the railcar.

With financial help from the Schroders' friends and family, the railcar began its journey to Tennessee. On August 23, 2001 the railcar was transported by train to a Norwegian ship for its 4,000 mile trip to Baltimore Harbor, arriving on September 9, 2001 and then placed on a flatbed truck to its new home in Whitehall, Tennessee arriving on the fateful day of 9/11.

This monument, the Children's Holocaust Memorial, consists of the authentic transport railcar which holds the 11 million paper clips representing lives lost. The monument was uncovered on the anniversary of Kristalnacht, November 9, 2001.
