



The NCJW National Convention, held every three years, is always exciting. Great speakers and in-depth workshops are informative and energizing. This year in particular, according to CEO Nancy Kaufman, the convention "focused on post-election skills-building workshops, arming participants with advocacy and leadership tools as they return to their communities and get involved in local, statewide, and national efforts to enact progressive policies that are good for women, children, and families." Barbara Nussbaum and I were fortunate to be the representatives of our Section in Atlanta.

an amendment to a resolution about consumer protection...to add the goal of being protected from bank fraud and other misdeeds by financial companies we should be able to trust. However, our proposal was not accepted by the committee. I decided to present my rationale to the hearing...not really to challenge the committee, but just to get my point across to those in attendance. When I did, I found that others liked the idea and were willing to help craft better language to meet the committee's concerns. With this new wording, the amendment was accepted.

For the first evening, sections presented "best practices" in many realms: fund raising, communication, recruiting members, etc. Of course Barbara and I wished we could clone ourselves to attend every one. I chose to learn about other sections' community service projects that bring publicity and attention to the NCJW "brand."

Issue-oriented workshops occupied us from then on. Attendees had the chance to learn more about taking action to achieve NCJW's national priorities. At the Women Who Dared luncheon, we presented NCJW's highest award to Hillary Clinton, who gave an inspiring response via video. (You can watch the video at the National website, ncjw.org.) Then on the final night, we attended the Leadership Gala. Of course this was special to me, because I was about to join the National Board. But before the new Board was recognized, we heard from Congressman John Lewis, who represents Atlanta. He received NCJW's Faith and Humanity Award and urged us to remain positive and not despair, not matter how tough the road ahead may seem. When he came down from the stage, the audio tech began to play a song that he had mentioned, and many of the group got up to dance with the Congressman. Such a feel-good moment! It really lifted everyone's spirits.

Needless to say, I am thrilled to be embarking on my new role as National Board Director. I look forward to continuing my contribution to our Section as well as the National organization.

#### PROIECT DAWN by Karen Hartman

Project Dawn is inspired by the work of Dawn's Court in Philadelphia, PA, an innovative court program designed to transform the lives of trafficked women repeatedly convicted and caught up in the criminal justice system. Based on extensive observation and research, the play follows the high-stakes lives of these victims/participants as well as the Court staff in and around the Court's proceedings over several months. Each of the 7 female actresses double as victims/participants and Court staff (judge, lawyers, parole officers, and support staff), making it clear that either character subset could have landed on the other side of our justice system. *Project Dawn* is in no way a political treatise. It is bursting with urgency, but is also full of deep empathy and humor. The play bridges the gap between what audiences might currently know about sexual exploitation and what they could know--what is actually happening in their own backyard. It doesn't matter if your politics are to the left or to the right. The material will gnaw at your heart and inspire you to action. This play is the first world premiere from our nationally renowned New Play Frontiers Residency & Commission program at People's Light.

#### I had the joy of facilitating at the Holocaust Symposium

representing the NCJW. Ernie Gross, a survivor, not only recounted his life in the concentration camps but also taught these teenagers about being a giving and loving human being. We gave the students time for a think, pair and share to reflect on what they learned. Their feedback was extremely gratifying. We gave them the task of sharing the information Ernie and I shared to five human beings that were not at the symposium. These five people will be asked to share with five more people. We can make a difference in our world, one day at a time.






