#### FEMALE PROPHETS AND PROPHETIC WOMEN

Rabbi Rigler was appointed KI's Director of Religious Education in July 2003. After receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from Emory University, Rabbi Eskovitz Rigler earned her Master of Arts degree in Jewish Education from Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) in Los Angeles in May 2001 and was ordained as a rabbi in New York in May 2003.

Rabbi Stacy Rigler brings a love of kids and Judaism and a firm belief that Jewish education can be engaging and inspiring to her role as Director. Rabbi Rigler greets each student by telling them she is in charge of "smiles". It is her goal that students first learn to love Judaism, then they can learn about Judaism.

During her tenure at KI she has overseen the accreditation of both the Library and the Religious School programs. She has worked at Camp Harlam, the URJ Department of Jewish Education and the Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. and participated in the HUC-JIR/JTS Leadership Institute for Congregational School Principals. Rabbi Eskovitz Rigler has developed a well-rounded program that focuses on students' social and educational goals in order to create meaningful and memorable synagogue experiences. She engages the children in an exceptional curriculum while involving the families with creative programming and enrichment opportunities.

Rabbi Stacy Eskovitz Rigler is married to Rabbi Peter Rigler and they have three children.

#### **Our Martin Luther King Project**

This year the NCJW Greater Philadelphia Section will do its MLK project at the Mitzah Circle Foundation, on Monday, January 19 from 10a.m. to 12p.m. To all of you mothers, grandmothers and aunts, children ages 5 and above are welcome, although, as you know, those 8 and older are likely to be able to do more.

The mission of the Mitzvah Circle Foundation is to meet the needs of people in crisis. Their volunteers help to build capacity to meet the needs of so many of the most vulnerable who are struggling with crises related to illness, poverty, homelessness, etc.... The foundation hosts volunteer groups in their warehouse within a designated service-learning space called Classroom4Good. There, groups of all ages learn how, in their work, Mitzvah Circle incorporates their beliefs that every person matters, the meaning of kindness and compassion and that small things can make big differences in the lives of people.

On MLK Day, our NCJW Section will participate in activities that may include one activity centered around the Food Program, another around the Critical Needs program in which participants will be packing boxes of necessities for families and a third activity might include sorting donations of items that have been donated to Mitzvah Circle.

#### **NCJW Advocacy alert:**

PA state legislature gives legal standing to the NRA to sue local municipalities over gun safety laws.

On October 24 of this year, the PA General assembly passed HB80 which gives the National Rifle Association the legal standing to sue any municipality or county that passes a law which they deem harms gun rights. Governor Corbett quickly signed it. It was passed as an amendment to the sale of metals act! Several PA municipalities had passed ordinances which mandated gun owners to report their lost or stolen weapons. Not only does this bill allow the NRA to interfere with local laws, it provides that if the NRA should sue and win the case, then the local townships, boroughs , and/or municipalities would be liable to pay the legal expenses of the NRA. Of course, the NRA has deep pockets. This bill will have the effect of discouraging any local legislation intended to lower gun violence, due to the economic consequences for already financially strapped local governments.

Here is a list of how our local legislators voted. Voting against this bill would have been our preferred outcome. I have listed legislators who I believe represent many of our NCJW members. 
