## Legislative/state public advocacy report for October, 2015

## Pennsylvania is again facing a shortage of federal district judges

Lynne Jacobs is presently attending the coalition meeting of Why Courts Matter. After much pressure on Senator Toomey last spring to turn in his "blue slip" so Judge Restrepo could receive a senate committee hearing for his nomination, Judge Restrepo still has not gotten the opportunity for a full vote in the Senate. Stay tuned for further developments. PA is again facing a shortage of federal district judges.

## Status on PA funding of Planned Parenthood

Planned Parenthood has faced and will continue to face many more attempts to defund their program. Brendan Boyle, the congressman from the PA 13<sup>th</sup> district has staunchly defended Planned Parenthood. I received a lengthy letter from his aide Alana Shaw listing his consistent votes against the House Republicans' many bills to defund Planned Parenthood. As I pointed out in my blast e-mail of last week, our NCJW members who live in Bucks and upper Montgomery counties need to contact Patrick Meehan and Mike Fitzpatrick.

National Priority of EXODUS – NCJW'S ANTI-SEX TRAFFICKING CAMPAIGN: In pursuit of this NCJW mission, Lynne Jacobs and I have met and/or contacted people from a wide range of backgrounds including the Philadelphia Anti-Trafficking coalition, the Villanova Law Institute to address Commercial Sexual Exploitation, Dawn's Place (a shelter for recovering trafficked women), and the Montco anti sex trafficking coalition. Members of the Phila. anti-trafficking coalition includes representatives from Immigration, the F.B.I., and Catholic organizations.

On Thursday, October 15, 2015, Lynne and I will (have attended) a forum "Engaging Faith Communities: Ending Human Trafficking". As requested by the organizers of the forum, we will be bringing the life size cutouts of the trafficked teens. These will be at our own table at registration along with NCJW materials on sex trafficking. We are looking to partner with a project called "the Shoemaker Project" which has a program to educate 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> graders about the dangers of sex trafficking. We will meet with the Project Director at the October 15 meeting.

Legislatively, the push now is to contact all members of the PA Senate Judiciary committee to encourage passage of SB851, the Safe Harbor Act. This is the bill that state senator Daylin Leach described at the forum on April 23 at the federation building. In our effort to increase the Jewish Community's awareness of sex trafficking, Lynne and I will be preparing handouts for the member luncheon on Oct.20 and will speak briefly to the most pressing needs.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

During the High Holidays, most of us and our families sat down to sumptuous meals – this will be true again for Thanksgiving. Yet, according Mazon (A Jewish Response to Hunger) 49.1 million Americans live in food insecure households – 15% of Americans can't be sure if or when they'll have their next meal.

"Among the myths about hunger in America frequently repeated is the notion that is it better for local charities, not the government to feed people." Yet, "the charitable response could never be enough to meet the demand. Even the nation's largest anti-hunger organization can't make a dent in ending hunger in America." "Only the government has the capacity to address an issue of such magnitude and work toward a solution."

Three Torah laws teach "the right of the poor at harvest time." As Jews, we are taught that , all human beings in a society "have a "collective responsibility to care for the most vulnerable among us... Ending systemic hunger begins with advocates and ends with the government."

Therefore, we and organizations such as Mazon advocate for increases in programs that address food insecurity. Unfortunately recent trends include, efforts to cut rather than maintain and increase food assistance and other programs for the impoverished, and our most recent lobbying attempts to stop these cuts.

Given the recent climate, our personal and organizational charitable support to stem the tide of hunger continues to be vital. In addition to collecting food and giving grants to local food pantries, our section gives monthly grants to the JFCS Domestic Violence Project to purchase food gift certificates for women and their children who have fled domestic violence relationships.

Yes there are poor Jews who go hungry. These impoverished Jewish people have enough problems paying their rent, utility and medical bills - let alone worry about buying food for Thanksgiving. At the membership luncheon you responded generously donating \$1245 to help struggling victims of domestic violence bring the warmth of Thanksgiving and the light of Chanukah into their homes. Your ongoing generosity is greatly appreciated.

May you and your families have a wonderful Thanksgiving.

## AT THE CORE OR AT THE PERIPHERY? EVOLVING ROLES OF CONTEMPORARY JEWISH AMERICAN GRANDPARENTS

Gratz College identifies Dr. Rela Mintz Geffen as the president of Baltimore Hebrew University(BHU) from 2000-2007. She is currently Professor Emerita of Sociology. Prior to heading up BHU she was professor of sociology and coordinator of the programs in Jewish communal service at Gratz College, where she also served as dean for academic affairs for five years. She is a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary (BRE) and Columbia University(BS & MA), and her PhD in sociology is from the University of Florida. She has published more than 40 articles and book chapters and authored or edited four books including Celebration and Renewal: Rites of Passage in Judaism (JPS) and the Centennial Volume of Gratz College (co-edited with Dr. Marsha Bryan Edelman) entitled Freedom and Responsibility - Exploring the Challenges of Jewish Continuity Her most recent book, Conservative Judaism: Dilemmas and Challenges, was coauthored with the late Daniel Elazar and published by SUNY Press. Professor Geffen's major fields of interest are the sociology of religion, the family and gender roles. She is currently engaged in a qualitative study of American lewish Grandparenting.




