NCJW'S POST-ELECTION CALL TO ACTION

November 9, 2016, Washington, DC-NCJW CEO Nancy K. Kaufman released a statement renewing a Call for Civil Discourse upon the election of Donald Trump as the 45th President of the United States.

On November 9, the day after the election the NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN, noting the divisiveness of our country, responded to Donald Trump's pledge to be president for all Americans with its promise "to work at the grassroots level to build bridges of understanding based on our most basic values of dignity and fairness for all." NCJW stated its intentions "to work with the president-elect and congress to advance NCJW's priorities, which includes improving the lives of women, children, and their families and promoting a more just and equal society for all, regardless of race, religion, immigration status, socio-economic status, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression."

NCJW also urged congress to work across the aisle to resolve "our country's pressing problems including judicial vacancies, immigration reform, advancing reproductive justice, and preserving health care for millions of Americans, among others."

A GRANDPARENT'S LESSONS on HUMAN DECENCY.- A THANK YOU FROM HIS GRANDDAUGHTER



I will keep working for this country because I believe so strongly in America. It has been a tough week. To those who won this week, you have a huge responsibility.

Last night, as I flew back home, I felt like I did on the flight home for my grandfather's funeral - sad and unable to stop the tears, but proud at the same time. I named my son after my grandfather, Drew Springfield. Many of you from Georgia knew Drew. He set a good example of what it means to be a citizen of this country.

He went to a small one room schoolhouse in Murray County, GA. He skipped many grades (all grades were in the same room). He lost his mother at 6. At around 18, he was accepted in

officer training school and moved to attend an Army school along the Potomac River in Virginia, studying in the outhouse at night. He then made Army 1st Lieutenant, and went to Hawaii before being shipped to the South Pacific. He oversaw the building of airstrips across the South Pacific islands: Guadalcanal, Tinian, and so many more before landing on Iwo Jima. I say this because I take to heart many of the key lessons from his experience during the WWII years - an experience that is written in so many of our collective family histories.

I have been so concerned with many people embracing and even cheering the hateful rhetoric this season. Please, friends, as you celebrate your victory do not forget what so many brave Americans gave years and even their lives fighting for: here are a few of the lessons I think of when I think of him.

- Grandad oversaw an African American unit. He told me that there is no place for racism in this country and that too many of us do not take the time to know each other. He said he learned as a young man that we were no different by working side by side with his African American neighbors as sharecroppers in Chatsworth, and by standing alongside those brave men overseas. I never sensed racism in him and once asked him why, and that was his response.
- He told me that people the world over want to come to America because we are a good nation and he saw this desire firsthand during the war. He was so proud of this about our country. We are a nation of immigrants and for goodness sakes our demographic trends say that we must have a lot of immigration in order to maintain the workforce needs required to revitalize the economy and support the boomer and post-boomer generations.
- He also told me of the responsibility of nuclear weapons. I took him to see the Enola Gay when it came to a museum in DC and we had a memorable talk in front of the Iwo Jima memorial afterwards. Decades earlier, he had seen the Enola Gay at a refueling stop before it dropped the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima. He said he was conflicted. That had the bomb not been dropped I wouldn't be here because he would have been one of the first groups sent to invade the Japanese mainland. However, he talked about the agony of a weapon with that power and how we must always pray for leaders who will be responsible. We talked about our post-war defense agreement with Japan, and how it was important for the United States to do everything in our power to keep other nations from attaining weapons and a multifaceted arms race from ensuing. There are deep-rooted reasons for many of the steps we take around the world to protect and support our allies.

The comments during this election make me concerned that our not so distant history that so many gave their lives for is not understood. A real understanding of history doesn't make for good soundbites or reality television.

The forces of hate will destroy this country if we let them. It's tempting to turn to hate as our country struggles to realign to the forces of globalization that are frightening to so many as life as we know it is changing. We must work together to try to find the new way forward that incorporates everyone and draws on our better angels. Embracing hate, racism, sexism and bigotry as a country will be the end of us.

Thank you Grandad. I know you would have been first in line at the polling place, shaking hands, rattling your change in your pockets and loving to watch everyone vote. I loved voting with you and know who you would have voted to elect. Some of the tears I shed now are because your memory deserves better. I hope this country rises to your humble greatness. I will never give up.





Take Exit 40: Route 38 West/Moorestown. Just before 3rd traffic light, take jug handle on right for Mount Laurel Road. Turn left and cross Route 38 onto Mount Laurel Road (there is a gas station at the intersection). Turn right onto the second street, Hooten Road. Paulsdale is approximately 1/4-mile on the left.

From New Jersey Turnpike North or South

Take Exit 4: Moorestown/Philadelphia. Follow Route 73 North (stay in right lane). Turn right at Fellowship Road. Continue on Fellowship Road for several miles, through five traffic lights, until you reach Route 38. Turn right onto Route 38 and continue to Mt. Laurel Road. Turn right on Mt. Laurel Road and make another right at Hooten Road just one block from Rt. 38. Paulsdale is approximately 1/4-mile on the left.

From Philadelphia

Take the Ben Franklin Bridge to Route 30 East/Admiral Wilson Blvd. Follow signs to Route 38 East/Moorestown and Mount Holly (the exit ramp is on your left). Continue on Route 38 East, and pass Moorestown Mall on your right. Turn right onto Mount Laurel Road (there is a gas station at the intersection). Turn right onto the second street, Hooten Road. Paulsdale is approximately 1/4-mile on the left.
