GET INVOLVED WITH OUR NCJW GREATER PHILADELPHIA SECTION'S NEW Public Affairs Community Service (PACS) PROJECT

DID YOU KNOW THAT SEX TRAFFICKERS (THE MODERN TERM FOR THE WORD "PIMP") REGULARLY TROLL LOCAL MALLS LOOKING FOR VULNERABLE TEENS TO LURE THEM INTO PROSTITUTION?

Sex trafficking of women and children is not just a global problem affecting millions, it is a disturbing reality in the U.S. In fact, sex trafficking is the number one criminal money-maker in the United States. And the rate of sex trafficking in Philadelphia is high.

This modern-day slavery is growing. Today, there are more slaves in the world than at any other time in history.

Taking to heart our history as slaves in Egypt and our belief that no one should be exploited as we once were, NCJW aims to expose and address the aspects of this hidden and complex issue — sex trafficking in the US — with a focus on women and children through a powerful program of public awareness, education, and advocacy. This initiative is aptly named "Exodus".

As we have experienced liberation and freedom, it is our mandate to ensure our communities and laws respond to those trapped in our midst. Every woman and child deserves a life of freedom from coercion, violence, and sexual exploitation.

Beginning this spring, NCJW Greater Philadelphia will take an active role in this initiative. Our efforts will include the three national components, plus we will support a safe house for trafficked women located in the Philadelphia area. Our plans include:

PUBLIC AWARENESS: Section members will travel to synagogues, local malls, teachers', and school nurses' conventions, etc. with life-sized cardboard cutouts of 4 teenage victims of sex trafficking, each with the true story of the victim. We also plan to show documentary films about sex trafficking at community gatherings.

EDUCATION OF OUR MEMBERS ABOUT THIS ISSUE

SUPPORT OF A LOCAL SAFE HOUSE FOR TRAFFICKED WOMEN: donate household items, funds to purchase Septa tokens, perhaps tutor some of the women to pass their G.E.D. exam.

ADVOCACY: examine the PA anti-trafficking law as it now exists and advocate for improvements. In particular, we want to ensure that the PA state legislature's newly passed Act 105 thoroughly protects young victims by giving them "safe harbor" and placing them in special safe houses for a year -long program to attend to their mental, emotional and physical wounds. At this time, no such safe house for teen victims of sex trafficking exists in Pennsylvania

<u>Walking Prey.</u> Holly Austin Smith. An autobiography by a young victim of sex trafficking. Linda Smith (2009). Based on interviews with former trafficking victims in the U.S.

<u>Not in My Town: Exposing and Ending Human Trafficking and Modern Day slavery</u>. Dillon Burroughs and Charles Powell (2011). This book offers discussion about the U.S. slave trade and how it extends internationally.

<u>Bodies and Soul</u>: The tragic plight of three Jewish women forced into prostitution in the Americas: Isabel Vincent tells the true story of three women, who, like so many others from Eastern Europe, were forced into prostitution by a criminal gang of Jewish mobsters.

<u>Half the Sky:</u> Pulitzer Prize winners Nicholas Kristoff and Sheryl WuDunn guide us on an odyssey through Africa and Asia to meet some extraordinary women, including a Cambodian teenager sold into sex slavery.

Public Affairs Community Service (PACS)

We can always do more together than we can alone! On Martin Luther King Day 20 members of our section of the National Council of Jewish women, husbands, children and grandchildren volunteered at the Mitzvah Circle Foundation, a nonprofit organization that meets the needs of people struggling with crisis, serious illness, homelessness and poverty - serving the most vulnerable in our community.

Several of us assembled **Food4Hope bags** - personalized bags of food that go directly to homeless shelters and to schools whose students come to school hungry. The group filled 106 bags! This was a great experience for our grandchildren who wrote personalized messages of encouragement and decorated the bags. They also decorated boxes that would be packed for families in need.

Several members of the group packed boxes of critical necessities including personal hygiene products, clothing and diapers for people living in our communities who are struggling. Others sorted clothing to ensure that Mitzvah Circle Foundation only sends high quality items that will help restore dignity and uplift the people who receive them, allowing them to move forward in their lives.

It was a rewarding and educational experience for all of us who participated. We enjoyed working together to make a difference and found it very meaningful to learn about the work of the Mitzvah Circle Foundation. We were glad we could be of help to a wonderful organization that helps so many vulnerable people in our community. We hope to organize more group volunteer projects at their warehouse.

A New Law

On February 13th, Philadelphia City Council passed an earned sick days bill with a vote of 14-2. And that afternoon, Mayor Nutter signed it into law. Philadelphia is now the 17th city to pass earned sick days.

NCJW Greater Philadelphia Section was one of 106 member organizations of the Coalition for Healthy Families and Workplaces working on this issue. Special thanks to Linda Lempert who championed this cause and kept our membership updated. This earned health benefit will support 200,000 workers and their families as well as the health of the customers who use their services.




