### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we approach Mother's Day, I write this message dedicated to and in honor of today's women of NCIW, those who have come before us and those who will come after us. In Pirket Avot we are told that "social justice is essential to human survival" and that "justice for the poor and powerless determines the quality of a society and is a barometer of its destiny". It is no surprise to me that women, and specifically Jewish women, have always been at the forefront in promoting social justice. We can trace the roots of this spiritual vision, resolve and leadership of women back to our prophet Miriam. Miriam was a woman of vision who

linked worlds by bringing Pharaoh's daughter to Yocheved. She saw a bridge when others saw a chasm and danced across the sea with former slaves singing songs of freedom. (paraphrased and quoted from Or Ami's Women's Seder). Our organization, NCIW, the oldest lewish Women's Organization in this country has always been ahead of the the times in championing the needs of women, children and families while courageously taking a progressive stance on such issues as child welfare, women's rights, reproductive freedom and other social justice initiatives. In my recent reading, I have come across many references to the early work of NCJW. In The Boston Girl, I read that NCJW came out against lynching well before other anti-lynching movements in this country, even before Leo Frank was lynched in Georgia, back in 1915. It is no surprise to me that today NCJW has been at the forefront in combating Sex Trafficking in our community, a modern day form of slavery.

So, I honor all of you who, I know, will continue the work that needs to be done. May Miriam's spirit, nourish the women of future generations who, I believe, will play a key role in healing a fractured world. Happy Mother's Day to all.

### Greater Philadelphia Section at Day of Action in Harrisburg

On April 13, four of us represented NCJW at Planned Parenthood's annual Lobby Day in Harrisburg. We learned that as of last year, the Women's Health Caucus of legislators (a bi-partisan group from both House and Senate) decided to broaden their approach in their effort to get bills passed.

Recognizing that women's health and well-being are not a priority in PA, the Caucus developed a comprehensive list of goals, known as the Agenda for Women's Health. The Agenda focuses on policies that promote positive health outcomes for women and families and put an end to the health inequities women face. Examples of the kinds of bills we believe everyone can support include:

- Sanitary conditions for nursing mothers
- Workplace accommodations during pregnancy
- Protection from sexual harassment
- Closing gaps in healthcare for women veterans

Three hundred advocates around the state, wearing bright pink T-shirts visited legislators' offices, attended panel discussions, and participated in a big rally in the capitol rotunda. We welcome more of you to join us next year!

In the future all our NCJW members will be getting advocacy alerts to call your state representative and state senator to advocate for specific bills pertaining to the women's health agenda. We met with some state legislators who are members of the bi-partisan Women's Health Caucus who explained that since so many bills cross the desks of state legislators, if you want something passed, it is necessary to get and sustain the attention of your legislator. It's the "squeaky wheel that gets the most oil."

Are you (or do you know) a woman who is getting health insurance through the exchange? The Raising Women's Voices Coalition (which includes NCJW) would like to hear your comments. ### Happy that We're Getting HIPPY-er by the Day!

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) is a parent involvement, school readiness program that helps parents give their three, four, and five year old children a lifelong love of learning, and prepares them for success in school and beyond. NCJW-Greater Philadelphia Section members Eleanor Levie and Elaine Kline have made this program their main volunteer focus because they see HIPPY as the best way to help families escape the cycle of poverty. Yes, HIPPY certainly relates directly to our core mission: improving the quality of life for women, children, and families.

As NCJW members, we can be especially proud of HIPPY, because it came out of the NCJW Research Institute For Innovation in Education (RIFIE) in Jerusalem, in 1969. The HIPPY program came to the United States in 1984 and soon spun off from NCJW, becoming an independent non-profit organization in 1988. Hillary and Bill Clinton are major champions of HIPPY since as the governor's wife, Hillary brought HIPPY USA to Arkansas. To this day, headquarters are in Little Rock, AR. NCJW continues to champion HIPPY and NCJW members have always had prominence on its national board. See hippyusa.org for more information.

In the fall of last year, we found a HIPPY sponsor in Diversified Community Services (DCS), in the Point Breeze community of Philly. The poverty rate there is 37 percent, compared to the city's poverty rate of 28 percent---among the highest in the nation for an urban area. Eleanor and Elaine are working closely with the directors of two DCS high-quality child-care centers, and a newly-hired Director of Family Engagement. They are also co-chairs of HIPPY Advisory Committee, composed of movers and shakers from PCCY, United Way, CHOP, Maternity Care Coalition, a Principal of a neighborhood elementary school, among other important agencies and organizations.

Early in April, Eleanor participated in a ribbon-cutting ceremony at each child care center, where newly renovated resource rooms provide relaxing spaces for parents who come to be mentored. (see photos)

Our first HIPPY Advisory Committee meeting, scheduled for April 23, is being held at the home of NCJW member Sheila Chacker, with refreshments supplied by other members of the HIPPY standing committee, aka the NCJW Center City Book Club.

What can YOU do to help this HIPPY program succeed?

- I. Promote HIPPY within and outside of the community. Be an ambassador and advocate for this project—and trumpet the important work it does for early childhood education, via a powerful mode of family engagement through role-play.




