Panel Addresses Sex-trafficking Here in Our Region

On April 22, NCJW joined Jewish Federation’s Women of Vision, Women’s Philanthropy and Jewish Community Relations Council to present a luncheon program about Sex Trafficking in Pennsylvania, drawing a crowd of 180 people, including about 20 NCJW members and friends. Working against sex trafficking is one of NCJW’s National priorities. Lynne Jacobs, our Pennsylvania Policy Advocate, served on the planning committee..

Rabbi Rachel Kobrin of Congregation Adath Jeshurun in Elkins Park provided the introduction. She emphasized the urgency for Jews to address human sex trafficking--based on our biblical sources that describe the Jewish people’s experience with slavery in Egypt.

The panel consisted of Rachel Yudt, chair of the Montgomery County Anti-Human Trafficking Coalition, Risa Vetri Ferman, Montgomery County’s District Attorney, State Senator Daylin Leach and Jen Spry, a survivor of child sex-trafficking, who now works as a nurse and who advocates on this issue. All of the speakers noted that trafficking is a real issue in the United States, even here in Philadelphia, and that awareness is an important step toward prevention.

Senator Leach told us about a “safe harbor” bill he plans to introduce in the state Senate in Harrisburg in June. The bill, among other things, would grant full immunity to anyone 18 and under caught prostituting, refer victims of sex trafficking to relevant social services agencies and increase penalties of sex trafficking offenders.

At the end of the panel discussion, attendees were asked to sign a letter to be sent to Pennsylvania Senators Pat Toomey and Bob Casey, urging them to pass the Runaway and Homeless Youth and Trafficking Prevention Act, federal legislation that would protect homeless youth from trafficking and provide them with shelter and services. We later learned that both PA Senators voted in favor of this bill when it was introduced as an amendment to the anti-trafficking bill that was passed in April. Unfortunately, the amendment required 60 votes to pass, which it did not get. It’s important that we urge both our Senators to continue to support this measure.

Greater Philadelphia Section will continue to work to end this modern-day slavery, and new initiatives will be launched in the fall.

The theme for this year's holocaust memorial observance held on April 19 was "70 Years After Liberation: Legacy and Remembrance". Representing our section, Zelda Stern, a life member and board member of our Greater Philadelphia Section, laid a wreath at the base of the holocaust memorial sculpture, designed by world renowned sculptor, Nathan Rapport.

Engraved on the granite base of the sculpture is the following:

The Holocaust 1933-1945

Now and forever enshrined in memory are the Six Million Jewish Martyrs who perished in concentration camps, ghettos and gas chambers. In their deepest agony they clung to the image of humanity, and their acts of resistance in the forests and ghettos redeemed the honor of man. Their suffering and heroism are forever branded upon our conscience and shall be remembered from generation to generation.

NCJW National Leadership Conference: Fantastic!

On the first weekend in May, 150 NCJW leaders from around the country gathered near Washington, D.C. for Leaders' Retreat 2015, and we covered a lot of ground! From advocacy trainings to section leadership workshops, participants had the opportunity to gain new skills and deepen their knowledge.

Highlights included:

- Workshops on NCJW's "Core Four" initiatives — Reproductive Justice, EXODUS (anti-sex-trafficking), BenchMark (judicial nominations), and Gender Equality in Israel;
- A presentation on the Jewish Values that Inform Our Work, by Board Director, Rabbi Lori Koffman;
- Several sessions for State Policy Advocates (like me) to prepare us for lobbying our Senators on Tuesday, May 5;
- A film, Tricked, that details the horrific reality of sex trafficking.

When I led our PA delegation to the Hill, I was joined by five members of the Pittsburgh Section. We met with an aide to Senator Casey and spoke in favor of 1) passing a current bill that will bring services to runaway and homeless youth; 2) ending bans on insurance coverage for abortion; and 3) filling federal judicial vacancies. We were unable to meet with anyone at Senator Toomey's office, so we left information about our issues and priorities.

Overall, it was a great opportunity to spend time with other NCJW leaders and get to know them. As you can see from the photo, I bonded with two other delegates named Lynne.
