GERRYMANDERED JUDICIAL DISTRICTS STILL MIGHT BE A BALLOT INITIATIVE IN NOVEMBER



Many thanks go to our NCJW Section Legislative Chair, Liz Downing, who, with a coalition of groups (the League of Women Voters, American Association of University Women, Fair Districts, Bucks County Women's Advocacy Coalition) worked to marshal grass roots efforts to keep the question of Pennsylvania House Bill 38 off of the ballot in the upcoming May election. Thanks also to our many NCJW members who heeded Liz Downing's quidance on H.B. 38 by calling state legislators to protest this bill.

PENNSYLVANIA HOUSE BILL 38 would end the election of judgeships statewide and replace them with gerrymandered judicial districts. Had judicial districts been a reality before the 2020 Presidential Election, the State Legislature's fight to overturn the Presidential election results in Pennsylvania might have succeeded.

There are efforts to put H.B. 38 on the ballot in the November 2021 election. It is important to note that, historically, Pennsylvania voters vote "YES" on ballot initiatives. Hopefully, the enormous voter education campaign will make a difference. STAY TUNED!

AND ON A FEDERAL LEVEL

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW about U.S. House Bill HR 1 and U.S. S 1 THE FOR THE PEOPLE ACT OF 2021, the voting rights act.

The For the People Act purports to expand Americans' access to the ballot box, reduce the influence of big money, strengthen ethics rules for public servants and implement other anti-corruption measures to fortify our democracy. The bill would require states to allow a minimum of two weeks of early voting. All eligible voters could vote by mail for any reason. All states would be required to conduct elections by paper ballot to safeguard votes. To address unfair practices with gerrymandering, states would be required to create independent commissions to conduct redistricting.



HR 1 passed the House on March 8, 2019, but has been blocked in the Senate since then. There is now a renewed effort to make this major reform bill a top legislative priority in the Senate.

REMEMBER, this is at a time that, according to the Brennan Center for Justice, state legislatures around the country have filed more than one hundred bills to tighten election laws to restrict voting, triple the number from last year!



MARCH 18th, 2021 at 6:30 PM - In celebration of Women's History Month, Preservation Pittsburgh is pleased to announce a free virtual lecture on *Pauline Hanauer Rosenberg & Her House* presented by Matthew Falcone, President of Preservation Pittsburgh, who will discuss the life and legacy of Pauline Rosenberg (1863-1940) and her Deutschtown home.

Presented in collaboration with the National Council of Jewish Women, Pittsburgh Section

Rosenberg founded the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW), its Pittsburgh section, and other Pennsylvania sections while she was living in the house. She advocated for progressive causes related to education, immigration, women's rights, and children. Landmarked in 2020, Rosenberg's former home is now the second city designated historic landmark that recognizes women's and Jewish history.

A Tribute To Celia Rothkopf from Sandy Fryer

I am delighted that Lauren asked me to share some words about Celia's connection with NCJW because Celia enriched our Greater Philadelphia Section in so many ways.

When one feels passionately about her involvement with NCJW, she reaches out to her friends to join. Luckily for us, Celia was one of my friends who joined our section.

Early in Celia's years as a member, we had a backpack drive and a winter coat drive for impoverished school children. When Celia turned up at my home with 12 fully stocked new back packs and later 12 brand new winter jackets, my mouth dropped open. Typical to Celia, she asked to remain anonymous.

When we were looking for a new recording secretary, a very difficult office to fill, Celia graciously agreed and served in this office for 2 years.

So many of our members described Celia just as Bobbie Berman did when she shared these words with me, "Celia was a beautiful person, very kind, generous and caring. It was always a pleasure to talk with her. I am very lucky to have had her as a friend."

When Celia was not able to hold an office due to family and personal health issues, she continued to be a generous supporter of our important efforts.

Linda Lempert shared the following: "Celia as we all know was a very private person, unassuming and extremely generous. Several years ago, when we were looking for funds to buy a mattress for a young woman just getting her own apartment after recovering from having been sex trafficked, Celia volunteered to pay the entire cost – anonymously of course, which was typical of Celia – she never wanted covet."

When Celia was feeling better and able to be more involved, I suggested something to our president, Barb Nussbaum who shared the following:

"I was so so sad to hear about Celia. Such a lovely, fine woman. When I asked Celia to Co- chair the Holocaust Essay project her first reaction was, "I really cannot do that because it is too close a subject for me." I totally understood. Then a week later, she called to say she thought about it and because the subject was so close to her, she decided that she should co-chair the committee. What a mensch."

What many of you might not know about, Celia , was in her quiet way she was a wonderful financial supporter of our section. I would call to thank her for her generosity and she wanted no recognition. she truly understood the meaning of Tzedakah."

Our NCJW section will miss Celia very much.

On a personal note.

Dear Celia,

You were the best friend anyone could hope to have. Whenever, anyone in my family had health issues, I knew I would get a daily phone call from you. I will miss your emotional support. I will miss our philosophical discussions about parenting, grand parenting and life in general. I will miss being able to call you about translations of Yiddish phrases. I will miss the daily witty and funny texts with which you greeted our "girls text group" each morning over the past year. You kept all of us laughing.

When we received the phone call about your passing, we were playing Bridge on line. Larry put his head in his hands and could not continue playing. Larry and I will miss the times we spent, just the three of us together. We both treasured our friendship with Brad and with you. Both of you were "Gita Neshamas." Our children also have treasured and appreciative memories of you. To know you, was to love you. We feel very lucky to have had you as a friend.
