ADVOCACY

THE DEFENSE OF ABORTION ACCESS FROM AN "EXPLICITLY JEWISH PERSPECTIVE".

A *New York Times* November 23 editorial by Sarah Seltzer addressed the peril women face to their "religious and bodily freedom" should abortion access be weakened and/or Roe vs. Wade be overturned. Seltzer is a former employee of NCJW and current editor of Lilith, an independent Jewish-American feminist, non-profit publication. In this editorial she cites NCJW's new campaign 73FORWARD and NCJW CEO Sheila Katz for the defense of abortion access from an "explicitly Jewish perspective." Seltzer sees at stake the preservation of opportunities to "create families, and individual futures, that are wanted, cherished and loved-a treasured Jewish value."

ANTI-SEMITISM IN OUR BACK YARD

A woman stood sobbing at the monthly Central Bucks School Board meeting in November. She had just heard applause for an anti-Semitic tirade by a local community member. She listened as other community members railed against mask mandates and curriculum that included diversity, equity, and inclusion. She expressed despair that she had moved her family to a community that held values that caused her pain.

She bravely returned to the December Board meeting where she encountered our NCJW section member and Advocacy Chair, Elizabeth Downing. Liz was representing NCJW as a member of a coalition attending the School District Meeting in response to the events of the November meeting. The coalition included Temple Judea of Doylestown, Women's Advocacy of Bucks County, the Bucks County League of Women Voters, Rise up Doylestown, the Peace Center and other social justice groups. One hundred members of the coalition had joined a zoom meeting to strategize. They showed up in large numbers carrying signs. Co-President of the Bucks County League of Women Voters,

Sandy Kerr, prepared a speech to the Board and school community. The turnout was so large that the School Board allowed only 70 people to be admitted to the building. Those outside, were provided a livestream of the meeting. Liz, who had stood out in the cold for three hours to ensure a seat, ceded hers to Sandy Kerr, so that her speech could be delivered. Unfortunately the School Board has opted to not discourage offensive speeches, and is against masking. The coalition will have their representatives in attendance at future Board meetings and curriculum committee meetings to support diversity, equity and inclusion. Stay tuned.
