Abortion Access is A Matter of Economic Justice

For years, we have talked about abortion access as it relates to bodily autonomy and individual agency. We have talked about choice and about control over our reproductive health as an individual right. And it most certainly is that. But apart from an issue of human rights, access to abortion is an issue of *economic justice*. Women's participation and advancement in the workforce is key to creating a positive business environment and spurring economic growth. One critical factor in achieving workplace equality for women is to ensure access to the full range of reproductive health care, including contraception and abortion.

At NCJW, we have a three-pronged agenda this year that is consistent with our position in supporting the health and happiness of all people. Our three priorities are abortion access, voting rights, and economic justice. It is clear that all three are intrinsically connected.

Without the ability to elect officials who support our positions it will be much more difficult to move forward. And economic research indicates that abortion access profoundly affects women's lives by determining whether, when, and under what circumstances they become mothers. The resulting outcomes reverberate through their lives, affecting marriage patterns, educational achievement, labor force participation, and earnings.

For example,

Educational attainment. Access to abortion increases women's probability of graduating college by 72%. This effect is even larger for women of color whose chances of completing college increase 2 to 3-fold. **Earnings.** Being able to delay motherhood by one year, with access to legal abortion, increased women's wages by 11% on average.

Labor force participation. Access to abortion improves a woman's availability for work, increasing the probability that she will work 40 or more weeks per year.

Professional occupational attainment. Access to abortion expands career opportunities, including the higher likelihood of attaining a professional role by almost 40%.

Financial security. In studies that compared women who wanted an abortion but who were unable to get one because they were just past the cut-off date with women who had an abortion in time, women who did not have an abortion subsequently were more likely to have financial problems. Being denied an abortion increased the amount of debt 30 days or more past due and increased negative outcomes such as bankruptcy and eviction by 81%.

Access to abortion not only shapes the economic future of pregnant women but also the economic circumstances that children grow up in. Abortion access reduced the number of children who were unwanted, reduced cases of child abuse and neglect, reduced the number of children who live in poverty, and improved long-run outcomes of an entire generation of children by increasing their likelihood of attending college and reducing their likelihood of living in poverty and receiving public assistance.

And what economic support do we provide for mothers who may have these unplanned pregnancies? Working mothers face a "motherhood wage penalty," earning lower wages than women who did not have a child.

Maternity leave may combat this penalty, as it allows women to return to their jobs following the birth of a child, thus encouraging them to remain attached to the labor force. However, the US only offers up to 12 weeks of UNPAID leave through the FMLA, which extends coverage to less than 60% of mothers. And even if a mother can return to work, childcare in the US is costly and often inaccessible.

Families with infants can expect to pay about \$11,000 a year for childcare, and subsidies are available to only 1 in 6 children that are eligible. Without a federal paid leave policy and access to affordable childcare, the US lacks the infrastructure to adequately support mothers, making the prospect of motherhood financially unworkable.

It's important to keep in mind that women who seek abortions tend to be low-income mothers experiencing disruptive life events:


- 49% are living below the poverty line
- 59% already have children
- 55% are experiencing a disruptive life event such as losing a job, breaking up with a partner or falling behind on rent.

Only about 1/3 of workers in the bottom decile of the wage distribution have access to paid sick leave (compared to 95% in the top decile).

People of color are particularly affected because of systemic inequalities in the American economy and in the health care system. Abortion access improves economic outcomes for women of color, particularly Black women, at a higher magnitude than for white women.

The need for accessible and affordable options for women, whether they choose to have a child or have an abortion could not be more critical. I strongly urge you to support legislation that increases a woman's right not only to *choice*, but to <u>afford</u> and <u>access</u> that choice.



THREATS IN OUR OWN BACK YARD

Central Bucks High School South Librarian, Matt Pecic, was ordered by the school's Principal to remove four posters with a quote from Elie Wiesel, Holocaust Survivor, peace activist and author. His daughter, a ninth grader in the school district had emailed the quote to her father saying "this quote reminds me of you". The order was made on the premise that the posters were in violation of Policy 321, a policy newly passed by the School Board which bans educators from advocacy activities. Members of the wider school community expressed their outrage on social media leading to the rescinding of the order. Below is a picture of the posters Mr. Pecic restored to the library in addition to adding many more.

A BIT OF NCJW HISTORY

Founding and Early Years

The NCJW's dominant guiding force was represented by its founder, Hannah G. Solomon. Solomon, who served as the organization's first president, was a quintessential American clubwoman. Married to a businessman, she was financially well off, leaving her with free time to serve in civic organizations. She believed that with status came the responsibility to serve and care for her community, from supporting the arts to serving the needy. Occasionally that meant engaging in activities that seemed to stretch the boundaries of "proper" womanhood such as entering politics. In fact, NCJW would prove to be an important political training ground for dozens of political appointees. The most famous was arguably Belle Moskowitz, who served in the administration of New York governor Alfred Smith.

But such forays into politics were always justified as extensions of motherhood, an ideology now termed by scholars "domestic feminism." Clubwomen believed in a modest form of women's rights, including woman suffrage, but they justified those rights not as the logical outcome of equal citizenry but as necessary to carry out their traditional duties as wives and mothers.

Clubwomen were the greatest influence in the NCJW's early years, with some groups simply transforming themselves from literary or sewing circles into NCJW sections. However, also among the founders was a second group that formed an influential minority. Typified by the woman who made the call to organize at the founding convention, Sadie American, and the woman who reportedly suggested the organization's name, Julia Felsenthal (daughter of renowned Reform rabbi Bernard Felsenthal), these women were somewhat younger than their clubwomen counterparts. They were also single, and many worked as social workers. Where clubwomen raised money for settlement houses and occasionally conducted programs there, these women staffed settlement houses. For the social workers, belonging to a sewing club or literary circle, even one that substituted Jewish topics for secular ones, was not enough. They steered the organization toward a more active role in the immigrant Jewish community, with emphasis on conducting programs for "clients" rather than on implementing programs for members.

Where the two factions came together was in their commitment to social justice, the preservation of Judaism and the Jewish community in the United States, and a vision of religion that combined the two. Together they made a formidable team—one group with the capacity to raise needed funds (including women from such wealthy and influential families as the deBeerses, the Sulzbergers, and the Harts), and the other with the experience and energy to design and implement the programs for immigrants that would come to be the core of NCJW's organizational identity.

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
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
