Pennsylvania's 2023 Primary Election on May 16th

Choosing Judges for State and Local Courts and Local Officials Who Will Govern Your Communities

Important Deadlines:

- PA deadline to register to vote: May 1, 2023
- PA deadline to request a mail-in ballot: May 9, 2023
- PA Primary Election Day: May 16, 2023

In the primary election on May 16th, 2023, Pennsylvanians will be asked to choose their party's nominees for judges to serve on the state Supreme Court, Superior Court, and Commonwealth Court. The judges and justices who serve on these courts make extremely important decisions regarding voting rules, redistricting, the criminal justice system, and more. Many policy disputes between the governor and legislature end up being litigated by this part of the judicial branch.

Since the death of Chief Justice Max Baer, the state Supreme Court is made up of four Democrat and two Republican justices. The seventh Justice, who will be elected in November, can play a role in the composition of the court over the next several years, since these are ten-year appointments, unlike the lifetime appointments in the federal Supreme Court.

On a more local level Common Pleas Court and magisterial district judge candidates will be chosen, as well as local officials involved in governance of municipalities, including mayors, county commissions, city council members, and school boards. These elected officials can have a major impact on the quality of life of the community. In the last few years school board decisions have garnered local and national attention, playing a major role in banning books in classrooms and school libraries, and tweaking the school curriculum, often ignoring the desires of other parents and students. So local elections are important!

The state's primaries are closed, meaning only registered Democrats and Republicans can vote for candidates during these spring contests. However, unaffiliated and third-party voters can vote on ballot questions, other referendums, and special elections during a primary.

As the local voting office makes the ballots available, the information becomes accessible on the vote411 site.

Legislators in PA are taking action to strengthen laws intended to minimize gun violence.

We can help get this done.

- 1. A bill to establish the use of *Extreme Risk Protection Orders* (ERPOs) in PA has been introduced in the PA state legislature. This would prevent anyone who is a danger to themselves or others from possessing a gun.
- 2. Pennsylvania remains one of the states that does not require the reporting of missing weapons. Legislation that would require reporting of lost and/or stolen guns could stop this deadly trajectory and save lives. We need this in PA, where on average, 21 guns go missing every single day.

Help us save lives: Take action to send an <u>email to your legislators asking them to co-sponsor both the ERPO bill and the bill to require reporting of lost or stolen guns</u>.

Even better: follow-up with a phone call to your state legislators.

A BIT OF NCJW HISTORY

Early Years

The National Council of Jewish Women was founded at the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago. Under the auspices of the World Parliament of Religion, Hannah Solomon, a prominent Jewish Chicago clubwoman, organized the Jewish Woman's Congress. Circular letters were sent to large cities, asking Jewish women to hold local mass meetings electing delegates to meetings in Chicago convening on September 4, 1893. At these larger meetings, upon hearing papers and speeches by Jewish women, attendees formed the National Council of Jewish Women with the intent to promote religion, philanthropy, and education.

Delegates did not delay in translating the energy from the Jewish Women's Congress into the formation of local Council Sections. Synagogue sisterhoods had not yet emerged as regular An attempt in May of 1894, led by Minnie D. Louis, features of American synagogues. produced dissension between Orthodox and Reform women and prevented the successful organization of the New York Section. It wasn't until November 1894 that a group of 120 Jewish women formed the New York Section, and Rebekah Kohut, widow of Rabbi Alexander Kohut, with both Conservative and progressive ties, became its first president. Other leading women included Julia Richman, Esther S. Ruskay, Mrs. Frederick Nathan, Sarah Lyons, Minnie Isaacs, Dinah Gitterman, and Mrs. David L. Leventritt. Kohut noted, "The Council brought every sort of personality into its fold, people of the aggressive organizing type, of the modest retiring sort, women who were lukewarm about their religion, women who were intensely religious, members of the old families, and some of the latest comers to America." Kohut worked especially to develop collaboration among the Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform women who agreed to meet on the common ground of social service. New York Section hosted the National Council's first convention, November 15-19, 1896, attended by 250 members. Having been recently absent from Section affairs due to family needs, Kohut welcomed National Council but then resigned as New York Section president, believing in the rotation of office and wanting to devote more time to study.
