Election in Pennsylvania November 7th, 2023 Issues Important to NCJW are on the Line!

State and local elections impact our lives, playing a major role in voting rights, access to reproductive health care for women, gun safety, environmental laws, policing, and school curriculum, among a host of other issues that are important to us. This election will determine who controls the State courts and at the local level, the Common Pleas Court and Magisterial District judges as well as who will run local governments and school boards.



The state courts are often the only place to take action to stop harmful laws after they are passed by lawmakers. Many policy disputes between the governor and legislature end up being litigated by the lower appellate courts, often ending up in the state Supreme Court. Access to the ballot, and determining districts for representation locally, statewide and nationally is determined at the state level, and the PA Supreme Court has often been the final arbiter.

The Pennsylvania Supreme Court currently has four Democrat and two Republican Justices, and the seventh Justice will be chosen in November. Daniel McCaffery, a Democrat, who has vowed to protect "women's reproductive rights", is running against Carolyn Carluccio, a Republican who's promised to defend "all life under the law."

In addition to filling one seat on the Supreme Court, there are two vacancies on the Superior Court and one vacancy on the Commonwealth Court. Two Justices on the Superior Court are running for retention, one Republican and One Democrat.

What is retention?

Pennsylvania has a merit retention provision in its constitution that allows all judges except magisterial district judges to be retained with a simple "yes" or "no" vote with no reference to political affiliation on the ballot. The rationale for this provision was to remove judges from the pressure of politics once they begin their first term of office. However, we can access information about their performance and if they are recommended by the Pennsylvania Bar. The above cited Spotlight article as well as vote411.org and ballotopedia.org can provide this important information.

Currently there are two sitting Superior Court judges seeking retention. Judge Victor P. Stabile, elected as a Republican in 2013, is seeking a second term. Judge Jack A. Panella, elected as a Democrat in 2003, is currently the president judge of the Superior Court and is seeking a third term. The Pennsylvania Bar Association recommends both Judge Stabile and Judge Panella for retention.

How to get information about county and municipal elections, including Court of Common Pleas candidates.

If you live in Philadelphia, go to ballotopedia.org, put in your address and be patient. Eventually your sample ballot will appear. I was able to click on the arrows to get information for each candidate. Ballotpedia provides information for all federal and state elections, but comprehensive coverage of local elections is available only for the 100 largest cities.

This year Ballotpedia is covering school board elections in Pennsylvania, but at this point there's only information about the May primaries. The links are below, and hopefully the information available will be updated.

Be sure to check your local papers for more information about who and what will be on your ballot.

Community Services Has Had A Busy Start To The Year

We sent \$500 to the Jewish Federation of North America and \$500 to World Central Kitchen to help provide services to the people of Maui. Addressing food insecurity continues to be a great need in our communities. To that end we donated \$350 to each of the following food pantries - BCHG-Doylestown, BCHG-Penndell, ERA Food Pantry-Bucks, JFCS Food Insecurity, Manna Center City, Manna on Main, Mattie Dixon Community Cupboard, Pennridge-FISH, Quakertown Food Pantry, and Warminster Food Bank. We will be dropping off copy paper and school supplies to Franklin Elementary School later this month.

Tzedakah is the primary word relating to the Jewish value of helping others. It is often translated as charity, but it comes from the word tzedek meaning justice. We are commanded to help others, both Jew and non-Jew, and to create a more just society. NCJW proudly continues its mission.

Note: At the parking-lot collection in July, folks suggested that - even at meetings - we enable members to put donations directly into our cars. This of course is much easier than carting them inside and bringing them out again. On September 19, we will experiment with this plan. *Gerrie and I will park near the entrance to KI - starting at 11 AM.* Anyone who has supplies to donate can drive up and give them to us **BEFORE** the meeting.

We are suspending donations to Mitzvah Circle at this time because they are now located too far away from our volunteer drivers. Please DO NOT bring any used clothing to donate until further notice.

We have started helping a different group, the National Giving Alliance. They distribute <u>new</u> clothing to families in need, and we've been volunteering to unpack and sort supplies they receive from manufacturers.





On the third Monday of the month we volunteer at NGA 822 Veterans Way Warminster. National Giving Association collects only new clothing and donates the clothing after getting a request from a social worker. It is a small building and quite nice to work in. We remove tickets from the clothing and place an NGA sticker on each item. We also take lists from social workers and pack boxes to be sent out.

Since the Pandemic, we have been trying to find organizations where we can physically volunteer. Our monetary donations are always welcome but having a members volunteer helps both the organizations and NCJW. We make our presence known in the community and we have a bonding experience that has been missing since the Pandemic.

I am always looking for other places to volunteer and would appreciate any suggestions. An e-mail blast will be sent out the week before the event.

A BIT OF NCJW HISTORY

Rose Brenner April 3, 1884-1926 by Peggy K. Pearlstein



As president of the National Council of Jewish Women, Rose Brenner focused on inclusion of people who were often marginalized—the deaf, the blind, and those isolated in rural areas. Brenner began chairing the local Brooklyn section of NCJW in 1908 and was made president in 1912, expanding membership, sponsoring a home for Jewish girls, and designating an annual "Council Sabbath." Brenner served as national president of NCJW from 1920 to 1926, doubling membership, creating a National Speakers Bureau and a Committee on Deaf and Hard of Hearing, and publishing the first Jewish prayer book in Braille. She also created a Department of Farm and Rural Work separate from the regular Immigrant Aid department, helping Jewish families on 3,000 farms.

Under Brenner's stewardship, the NCJW initiated and broadened efforts to Americanize immigrants while encouraging their continued religious and ethnic identity. Its work on resettlement,

citizenship, and peace efforts brought national and international recognition to the organization. Rose Brenner's leadership is also significant, since she was the sole unmarried woman to attain the presidency of the NCJW, an organization that had championed traditional Jewish motherhood alongside its commitment to public service.
