

One vacancy on the Pennsylvania Supreme Court needs to be filled. This court can determine access to reproductive care, voting rights, fair representation, gun safety, environmental justice, and more.

Carolyn Carluccio

- -Ran as a pro-life, pro-gun candidate in the May primary
- -Endorsed by the PA Pro-Life Federation
- -Former U.S. Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia "most reflects [her] judicial philosophy

- -Endorsed by Planned Parenthood PA and Reproductive Freedom for All, formerly known as NARAL Pro-Choice America
- -Endorsed by unions, the Sierra club, Working Families Party (WFP).

There are two vacancies on the Superior Court and one vacancy on the Commonwealth Court, as well as two Justices on the Superior Court running for retention, one Republican and One Democrat. At the local level Common Pleas Court and magisterial district judge candidates need to be chosen. In addition, local officials involved in governance of municipalities, including mayors, county commissions, city council members, and school boards will be elected on November 7th.

TWO REMARKABLE ORGANIZATIONS THAT RECEIVED CONTRIBUTIONS FROM OUR SECTION

The Female Hebrew Benevolent Society remains the oldest Jewish charitable organization in continuous existence in the United States. Our NCJW Section donates to FHBS every year.



In all communities the means of alleviating the sufferings of the poor are considered of high importance by the benevolent and the humane. The original subscribers, members of the Hebrew Congregation of Philadelphia, and citizens of the United States and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, sensible to the calls of their small society, and desirous of rendering themselves useful to their indigent Sisters of the House of Israel, associated themselves

together for the purposes of charity; and in order to make the benefit permanent, adopted this Constitution. From the Preamble to the Constitution of the Female Hebrew Benevolent Society, January 16, 1837

Founded over 200 years ago by the women of Congregation Mikveh Israel and guided by Rebecca Gratz, the Female Hebrew Benevolent Society remains the oldest Jewish charity in continuous existence in the United States. It is also the first independent organization established by Jews to serve Jews in the City of Philadelphia. In her chosen role as the first secretary, a position she held for nearly 40-years, Gratz set the stage for placing FHBS at the forefront of American Jewish social service.

The Society is overseen by a volunteer board of 13-managers who assume responsibility for administration and almost all overhead. There are no paid employees. Future board members serve as observers at semiannual meetings and gradually take on tasks as their knowledge of and commitment to our mission increases. Former board members may choose to serve as emeritae, participating in an advisory capacity to the extent that they are interested and able.

FHBS concentrates on four specific areas of assistance: emergency aid, including a small number of monthly stipends, personal emergency response systems for frail, elderly women, a pharmacy stipend program and camp scholarships. All cases are considered individually, taking into account any extenuating circumstances. Requests are filled as the treasury permits, often within a 24-hour period. Referrals come from communal professionals who screen the client to verify and prioritize her needs before making a recommendation to FHBS.

A BIT OF NCJW HISTORY

Immigrant Aid

In line with their emphasis on motherhood, (NCJW) council members and employees provided services to more than twenty thousand immigrant Jewish girls who arrived on American shores without guardians. They met girls at ports of entry, built settlement houses, provided vocational training and Americanization classes, shared tips on etiquette, provided cultural programs, and fought against the influence of the white slave trade. They visited girls in their homes to see how they were doing and acted as advocates for those in legal trouble.

Members who provided such aid were termed "friendly visitors," reflecting the council's belief that they were providing the stern but loving guidance that would have been provided by a stable home, had circumstances allowed. Some recipients of NCJW services viewed "friendly visitors" as annoying interlopers who offered help only because it served their own self-interest to combat antisemitism, not because they understood or cared about the immigrants' needs. There is no doubt that "friendly visitors" were separated from the girls they served by a wide economic and social gap.

In addition, many NCJW members were ambivalent about training girls to enter the workforce, doing so because they recognized the economic necessity but regretful that women who worked could not pay "proper" attention to care of children and home. Resulting policies included support of protective legislation for working women and corollary opposition to the Equal Rights Amendment. These policies were easy to adopt from the vantage point of wealthy homes, but they sometimes made life more difficult for the families they were supposed to help. Yet, unlike most other Jewish agencies, the council's model of philanthropy required more than giving money. All "friendly visitors" received training in modern social work, and the personal contact that many members had with the immigrant community humanized the statistics and, in many cases, led to genuine empathy. Furthermore, the NCJW differed from other (largely Christian) organizations that saw poor immigrant girls as "fallen" and in need of saving. The council believed that their clients were generally good people who merely needed to overcome unfortunate circumstances. The help they provided was therefore material, not spiritual. They did hope that the girls they served would become good Jewish mothers, and sometimes supported religious training toward that end, but their goal was to help the girls preserve their ethnicity in ways that were "appropriate" to America, not merely to preserve Judaism.

By most accounts, the NCJW's model of immigrant aid was highly successful. One New York City report credited the council's preventive programs with a 40 percent decrease in Jewish women arraigned for prostitution. NCJW leaders were invited to present sessions at international conferences, and their methods were taught in college classrooms. No organization wielded more influence over immigrant Jewish girls than the NCJW.

We remove tickets from the clothing and place an NGA sticker on each item. We also take lists from social workers and pack boxes to be sent out.

Our monetary donations are always welcome but having a members volunteer helps both the organizations and NCJW. We make our presence known in the community and we have a bonding experience that has been missing since the Pandemic.
