A REFLECTION ON PASSOVER IN THESE DIFFICULT TIMES

At our Passover Seders, we celebrate the liberation of Jews when our freedoms were in peril. We are again at an inflection point. Anti-semitism is on the rise fueled by responses to the October 7 brutalization of Israelis by Hamas and the subsequent toll on non-Hamas Gazans.

University campuses have become a fertile, yet unsurprising ground to launch protests by supporters of Gazans to express outrage and despair over the humanitarian crises. In a survey, conducted by Hillel International, a majority of Jewish students reported feeling unsafe on campus, having been targeted with threatening and derogatory speech. Universities have responded with security measures and protest guidelines.



Alarmed by the administration's recent efforts, under the guise of fighting antisemitism, to justify stripping students of due process rights when they face arrest and/or deportation, as well as to threaten billions in academic research and education funding, last week, NCJW was proud to join a group of ten Jewish organizations representing a broad swath of mainstream American Jewry – including three of the four denominations – to issue a joint statement rejecting the false choice between confronting antisemitism and upholding democracy.

This year, my husband and I had the pleasure of attending a "Freedom" Seder. It was a unique Seder with a strong social justice tilt. A diverse group of participants, Jewish and non-Jewish, came together to celebrate with a variation on the closing words of the traditional Seder. It is traditional to end a Seder with "L'shanah ha-ba'ah b'Yerushalayim Habnuyah"—Next year in Jerusalem!

The Freedom Seder version? Next year in harmony. The seder began by recognizing the brokenness of the world. At the close, a proposal, a hope, to commit to working together, to advance the vision of a rebuilt world, where all people connect with neighbors, and share sustainably, in the bounty of this planet.

WHAT OFFICES ARE ON THE BALLOT and WHY THEY ARE VITAL TO OUR COMMUNITIES!

CANDIDATES for Municipal and Judicial Offices who will preside over issues and cases.

Municipal Branch-handles cases such as contract disputes, small claims, traffic violations, municipal ordinance violations, landlord/tenant issues.

Judicial Branch-provides: a neutral forum for resolving disagreements between individuals, businesses, or the government; safeguards individual rights and ensuring fairness and justice within the legal system; provides judicial review, allowing it to review laws and actions of the executive and legislative branches to determine if they are consistent with the Constitution.
